

CLEVELAND INDIANS TAKE LEAD IN AMERICAN LEAGUE

Took Command from New York Yankees Yesterday by Virtue of Win Over Boston by Score of 4 to 1

New York, May 12 (U.P.)—Cleveland clinched a month of excellent play by wrestling the American League lead from New York, thereby discrediting somewhat the experts who gave the Indians only a fighting chance to retain fourth place for their fourth straight season.

Instead of slumping into second division, Roger Peckinpaugh's tribe launched an impressive drive toward Cleveland's second pennant since 1900. The Indians won their lone flag, and also the world championship from Brooklyn, in 1920.

Improved play in the field and continuance of last season's excellent pitching featured the climb. These assets combined with fair, timely hitting made the club a formidable, well-balanced outfit.

Beat Boston
Young Harder pitched and batted the Indians into command of the league lead yesterday as they trimmed Boston, 4 to 1, dropping the idle New York Yankees from a top tie to second place. Harder held the Red Sox to six hits, scored after a double and provided the decisive tally with a home run in the fifth inning. His mates pounded Andrews and Welch for 10 hits. Rick Ferrell, from the Browns, performed well in his debut as Boston's catcher.

Washington dropped to fourth position by losing to St. Louis, 4 to 3. Home runs by Ted Guile and Sam West each with a man on accounted for the Browns' four tallies. Irving Hadley's wildness in the first and second innings allowed the Senators two runs, and they made their third in the fourth when Ossie Blugie hit a four-bagger.

Wet grounds prevented New York's playing at Chicago, and Philadelphia at Detroit was washed out.

Henry V and Katherine of Valois had but one son, who succeeded as Henry VI. He was murdered in the Tower of London, and his only son, Edward, prince of Wales, was killed in battle. After the death of Henry V his widow married a Welshman named Owen Tudor who was reportedly descended on his mother's side from one of the Swiford sons of John of Gaunt. By this second marriage Katherine of Valois became the grandmother of King Henry VII and ancestor of all subsequent English monarchs.
