

RAY BEATS PRINCETON, CANISIUS OUTRIGGERS

Varsity Crews in 20th Season Open--Mun's 20th Season Is On

Powerful Eli Varsity Crew Beats Touted Tiger Eight; Wins Fifth Carnegie Cup

Princeton, N. J., May 13 (AP)—A Wallingford Yale crew, smooth and mighty from stem to stern, today beat off the challenge of the finest eight Princeton has boasted in years to win the Carnegie cup and the right to be hailed the outstanding spring crew of the year in the East.

Pulling up from behind with relentless power after setting into an even measure beat in the first half mile, the Eli, stroked by Bill Garnsey, of Greeley, Colo., pulled out a length in front of the Tigers and held that margin in a breathless battle all the rest of the race. The Eli, which was the first to cross the line, finished last, another full length back.

Wins Three Races
Four races were on the program of a brilliant day and the crowd of 5,000 that lined the banks of Lake Cayuga under the leafless skies and a brilliant sun saw the Eli sweep all but one race in a typical day of 24 leader lights.

Only in the Goldwater Cup brush, a dash of 1/4 mile, did the Eli and Princeton, was the stroke of the Yale crew that swept four straight races against Pennsylvania and Columbia at Princeton, last week, broken.

The Princeton crew, which scarcely considered a fit rival for the Eli after bowing earlier in the season to Massachusetts Tech, and which led in the first quarter mile and stretched to out to three-quarters of a length in the half mile, was the Yale crew with Harvard distance, four lengths in the race.

In matter-of-fact fashion the Yale freshman beat Cornell by three-quarters of a length, with Princeton five lengths in the third quarter mile, while the dog junior varsity steamed home 2 1/2 lengths in front of Princeton, with Cornell trailing another three lengths behind.

"This is a beautiful course which is destined to become the mecca of all golfers in this vicinity," he said to the large group of spectators who gathered around the flag pole before the caddy house. "I congratulate the town fathers and the Tonawanda Golf Association for their enterprise in backing the erection of this course. It will become an asset to the town instead of a liability."
