

Dr. Pott Will Address Elmira College Club On February 19

Will Tell of His Reactions to Recent Developments in China—Was Born in That Country—Taught in University in Shanghai

Dr. William S. A. Pott, president of Elmira College, will address the members of the Elmira college club of Western New York, following a luncheon on Saturday, February 19, in the Twentieth Century club, Buffalo. Dr. Pott will tell of his reactions to the recent developments in China which is a subject of great interest to him, since he was born in that country and was for some time professor of philosophy and psychology in St. John's University, Shanghai, where his father has been president for over 40 years. Dr. Pott, who is one of the youngest college presidents in the United States, was inaugurated as president of Elmira College in 1935. Following his graduation from the University of Virginia in 1912, he accepted an assistant professorship at that institution in 1922, and after a time became associate professor. In 1927 he was called to the University of California as chairman of Oriental languages and literature, and later, was

How Can I?

Q. How can I remove grease spots from silk material?

A. Mix and apply one ounce of castile soap shredded, one teaspoonful of salt, two ounces ammonia and one quart of water.

Q. How can I relieve tired feet?

A. Boracic acid in the foot bath will not only relieve tired, perching feet, but will also remove an unpleasant odor. Buy ten cents worth from any druggist and ask him the proportion to use.

Q. How can I fill cracks in the floor, neatly and permanently?

A. Make a paste of 1-2 pound of flour, 1-2 pound of alum, and 3 quarts of water. Mix and boil. Then soak some newspapers in this paste thoroughly until about the consistency of putty. Force this mixture into the cracks with a putty knife. It will harden almost the same as cement.

Q. How can I remedy tender feet?

A. According to one authority, nothing is better for tender feet than a cold foot bath, followed by a brisk rub with either alcohol or olive oil, and then a dusting with talcum powder.

Q. How can I keep eggs fresh for a longer time?

A. While the eggs are still fresh, rub each one thoroughly with either butter or glycerine.
