An expert on the operation of a professional baseball team in the lower minors will be here Wednesday for a public meeting to discuss the possibility of fielding a team to represent the Twin Cities.

George Cluqueno, former president of the PONY League, will be at the Elks Club for the open meeting to answer questions and outline requirements for a team in organized baseball at the lower minors level.

Mr. Cluqueno is coming at the invitation of William L. Ramsay, North Side recreation director, and Clint Small, Tonawanda High physical education director, who are chairman and co-chairman in charge of the meeting.

Mr. Cluqueno at present is a school principal in Penfield, a position he accepted at the close of the last term. Before that, he was an elementary school principal in Hornell for many years.

His experience with professional baseball in Hornell was from the bottom up. He managed the team's concession stand for a number of years, later became business manager and then was president. He was a vital factor in keeping professional baseball in Hornell through 12 turbulent financial years. He also was instrumental in bringing to Hornell a franchise with the Brooklyn Dodgers which meant the city's first championship team and a record-high attendance of nearly 100,000 admissions in one season.

NORTHVILLE, Mich. (UP) — Sentiment is strong today to change an antiquated rule which makes a mockery of the PGA Golf Tournament.

Eight of golf's 20 money-winners weren't even on the scene at Meadowbrook Country Club as Doug Ford won the PGA championship. They were barred by an ancient rule that entrants must have been professionals for five years.

But at long last the growing feeling among the pros is that the rule is passe and should be changed for the benefit of the paying public as well as for the good of the rich PGA tournament.

'Name' Players Barred

The unfortunate eight included Mike Souchak, the year's second leading money-winner; Gene Littler, touted as the coming king of the game; Bob Rosburg, Billy Maxwell, Dow Finsterwald, Dick Winger, Bud Holscher and Dick Mayer. Because of an outdated rule they had to sit this one out.

The five-year rule is a hangover from the old days when there were only a few lucrative tournaments and the veterans jealously cut up the swag at hand. They didn't want the "fly-by-nights" stepping in and making off with the loot.

Outgroup Clubmaker's Rule

Another factor then was that, in the old days, to be a true golf professional a man had to be able to make clubs. Thus it was essential that the newcomers learn to make shafts and put the clubs together. Five years' apprenticeship was deemed highly necessary.

But these days there is no such necessity. Nobody makes clubs anymore. It is a factory proposition.

The new suggestion is that the U.S. Open and Masters champions as well as the top 30 money-winners be permitted to play in the PGA as well as any players, passed by the tournament committee, who have played a majority of the year's tournaments.

Certainly it's about time the PGA got on the ball and gave the young fellows a break. They, after all, are the future stars of the game and they'd be a terrific asset, not a hindrance.

## Easy Advance Of Top Stars Is Threatened

SOUTHAMPTON, N.Y. (UP) — The easy advance of seeded American stars in the Meadow Club Invitation tennis tournament was seriously threatened today when third-seeded Herb Flam clashed with Brazil's Rinaldo Moreira, the recent conqueror of Australia's Lew Hoad.

As the players headed into today's third round, the only seeded players eliminated were foreigners — Bob Falkenberg of Brazil and Alejandro Olmedo of Peru.

But Moreira, who wallops his shots with a double-handed grip in the style of pro star Pancho Segura, posed a real threat to Flam, of Beverly Hills, Calif. who is a master of defensive tennis. The Brazilian stunned the tennis world last week by sweeping a Davis Cup match in straight sets from Hoad, the star whom Australian officials call the "best player in the world."

Top-seeded Tony Trabert, the Wimbledon champion from Cincinnati, Ohio, was expected to have little trouble today with John Lesch of Los Angeles. After drawing a first-round bye, Trabert debuted in the tournament Wednesday with a 6-2, 6-0 victory over Dr. Jack Geller of Purchase, N.Y.

Stiff competition was expected today in the following matches: Fifth-seeded Sid Schwartz of Long Beach, N.Y., vs Japanese Davis Cupper Atsushi Miyagi; top-seeded foreigner Kurt Nielsen, the Wimbledon finalist from Denmark, vs Hal Burrows of Charlottesville, Va.; and Grant Golden of Chicago vs Bill Quillian of Seattle, Wash.

Falkenberg, the 1948 Wimbledon champion who formerly resided in Beverly Hills, Calif., but has been in tennis retirement for some time, was upset by junior champion Gerry Moss of Modesto, Calif., 4-6, 6-0, 7-5, in Wednesday's second round, and Olmedo was upset by Quillian, 6-4, 6-2.

## Klis Hurls 2-Hitter To Notch 'Big' Win

Given a two-run bulge by his teammates in the first inning, Ron, (Whizzer) Klis set the Leroy All-Stars down with two hits last night as the North Tonawanda All-Stars won, 2-0, to move into the district finals of the Little League playoffs.

The first Leroy hit came in the second inning with two outs and was of the scratch variety. Coupled with a walk and an error, it constituted the only threat to the North Siders during the contest at Ernie Parks Stadium, Batavia. But Klis proceeded to strike out the hitter with the bases loaded to ease the tension. The second Leroy hit came in the fifth, but two fast infield plays erased the threat.

The North Siders got off to a fast start. Larry Vetter walked to open the NT half of the first inning, and scored moments later when Al Dworzanski slammed a double in to left center. Dworzanski followed Vetter across the plate when the Leroy centerfielder threw the ball away.

Jim Maglisceau singled in the third as the NT All-Stars tried to increase their advantage. But he was forced at second, and Walt Opalinski died on second when Tom Satchey grounded to the pitcher.

The North Siders almost had something going again in the fourth. Peter Trinkwalder opened the inning with a loud single, but an infield play and a pickoff of Don Stringfellow at second put out the fire.

Last night's game was played in a drizzle of rain on a soggy field. The sneakers the North Siders wore didn't provide much traction in the mud, and close plays were common.

Klis' pitching performance, his first in the playoff series, gave the NT All-Stars a big win. It set the stage for the district playoffs tomorrow at Cobbs Hill, Rochester, when the North Siders will oppose the winners of last night's Ironde-

## Opening Dates Set for Hunters

ALBANY (UP) — Uniform opening dates for all small game hunting seasons were announced today by Conservation Commissioner Louis A. Wehle.

Oct. 1 will be opening day for hunters in the northern zone of the state. Southern zone hunters may take to the field on Oct. 24.

These dates pertain to hunting of pheasant, partridge, gray squirrels, cottontail rabbits and raccoon.

The order establishing uniform dates was in answer to complaints by sportsmen. They said it was difficult for game wardens to apprehend law violators who took game not yet in season, while claiming to be hunting species on which the season had already opened.

## Plans Ready for New Layout Of Sheridan Park Golf Course

Plans for a revised layout of the Sheridan Park golf course, and an estimate of the cost of the project will be presented to the Town Board in about two weeks.

The plans have been drafted by Planning Consultant A. Russell Tryon in the hope of attracting major golf tournaments to the course, according to Councilman Walter M. Kenney, who is in charge of the township recreation facilities.

The Tonawanda NEWS disclosed last April that revisions in the Sheridan Park course were being considered, and that the township was planning the construction of a nine-hole golf course in Parker Blvd., near Ellicott Creek Rd.

Councilman Kenney said the plans for the Sheridan Park course will increase the chances of bringing tournament golf to the area.

"We could have had the National Public Links tournament here a few years ago if the course had been longer," he said. "Public Links officials promised to bring the tournament to Tonawanda if the course was improved."

The plans drawn up by Mr. Tryon call for adding about 800 yards to the present course, bringing the layout to about 6,500 yards. They call for the elimination of narrow and criss-crossing fairways, and renovation of the clubhouse.

"We're also going to work out a split nine, with the first and tenth tees and the ninth and 18th greens near the clubhouse," Mr. Tryon said.

The Town Board is enthusiastic about the proposed revision of the course. Councilman Kenney is sure the board members will authorize the necessary expenditure of funds for the project.

## 3,000 See Fleck, Hahn Demonstrate Shots at Sheridan

More than 3,000 persons — hundreds of them golfers who have difficulty staying on the fairways — were shown the right way to do it last night at Sheridan Park golf course.

And then they saw another golfer break all the rules and still line the ball 200 yards straight off the tee.

The lessons were provided by Jack Fleck, Davenport, Ia., pro who defeated Ben Hogan for the National Open title six weeks ago, and Paul Hahn, trick shot artist from Ormond Beach, Fla.

Their clinic was presented by Dunlop's sports department under the direction of Vincent Richards, former U.S. tennis champion.

Fleck showed the crowd the smooth technique that carried him through the grueling playoff against Hogan as he demonstrated iron and wood shots. Then Hahn, commentator for the clinic, unlocked his bag of tricks.

He proceeded to get off shots that were the envy of golfers in the crowd — although he used clubs with crooked, flexible and broken shafts, and shot left-handed, right-handed and with one hand.

Hahn's tricks plus his gags kept the crowd applauding.
